PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, the State of Mississippi regularly experiences the effects of severe weather, and throughout the State's history, numerous lives have been lost and tremendous economic damage has been caused by severe weather; and

WHEREAS, fall is the second severe weather season for our State and has proven to be active with severe thunderstorms, tornadoes and flash flooding; and

WHEREAS, the State of Mississippi experienced a total of 85 tornadoes in 2024; 53 of which occurred in the months of November and December; and

WHEREAS, the State of Mississippi has experienced a total of 73 tornadoes already in 2025; and

WHEREAS, the State of Mississippi over the past 10 years has averaged over 20 tornadoes per year in October, November and December; and

WHEREAS, history has demonstrated that well-informed and well-prepared citizens sustain less personal injury and fewer property damages as a result of floods and severe storms; and

WHEREAS, Mississippians should be aware that they can take an active role in improving their ability to survive and recover from tornadoes by having a NOAA Weather Radio and multiple other ways to receive warnings and knowing what to do when severe weather threatens; and

WHEREAS, the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency and the National Weather Service are urging Mississippians to be prepared for the upcoming fall season. The Mississippi Emergency Management Agency continues to prepare for tomorrow's disaster today through education focused on individuals, families and communities.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Tate Reeves, Governor of the State of Mississippi, hereby proclaim October 6 through October 11, 2025, as:

Fall Severe Weather Preparedness Week

Monday: Make a Plan Tuesday: Severe Thunderstorms

Wednesday: Tornado Safety with a state-wide Tornado Drill at 9:15 AM

(weather permitting)
Thursday: Flash Flooding
Friday: Lightning
Saturday: Mobile Home Safety
